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1 Introduction

Austria is a popular destination for international students due to its world-class universities and affordable tuition. However, non-EU/EEA/Swiss students need a visa or residence permit to study in Austria. This document provides a comprehensive checklist of required documents, eligibility criteria, application process, deadlines, fees, and tips for a successful student visa application in 2025.

2 Which Permission Do You Need?

- **Visa C:** Up to 90 days (short courses or preparatory stays).
- **Visa D:** 91 days to 6 months (applied at the Austrian embassy/consulate in your home country).
- **Residence Permit – Student** (*Aufenthaltsbewilligung “Studierender”*): For degree programs or study stays exceeding 6 months.

3 Checklist of Required Documents

A. Common to Visa D and Residence Permit

- Valid passport (plus copies) and recent biometric passport photos.
- University admission or enrolment letter.
- Proof of accommodation in Austria (lease or dormitory contract).
- Proof of sufficient financial means (see Section 4).
- Health insurance covering all risks (travel insurance until enrolment).
- Proof of origin of funds (bank statements, scholarship letters, sponsor documentation).
- Birth certificate and police clearance (may be requested).

B. Specific to Residence Permit – Student

- Completed application form in German.
- Declaration of regular expenses (loans, maintenance).
- Proof of academic progress (for renewals).

C. Specific to Visa D

- Travel itinerary and proof of previous Schengen visas (if applicable).
- Country-specific documents (local ID, residence card, extra copies).

4 Proof of Financial Means (2025)

Applicants must show funds according to Austrian social assistance reference rates:

- Students under 24: **€703.58/month** (~€8,442.96 per year).
- Students 24 and over: **€1,273.99/month** (~€15,287.88 per year).
- Couples: €2,009.85/month.
- Each child: €196.57/month extra.

If rent exceeds €376.27/month, additional funds must be shown.

5 Health Insurance

- Initially: travel health insurance covering all risks.
- After enrolment: Austrian public student insurance (ÖGK), preferential premium **€73.48/month in 2025**.

6 Application Process

For Visa C/D

1. Collect documents.
2. Book an appointment at the Austrian embassy/consulate.
3. Submit application in person (biometrics taken).
4. Pay visa fee.
5. Receive decision and collect passport/visa.

For Residence Permit – Student

1. Prepare your documents with legalization/translation if necessary.
2. Submit application abroad at an Austrian mission, or in Austria if visa-free.
3. Pay application fees and provide biometrics.
4. If applying abroad, collect Visa D for entry once approved.
5. Register your address in Austria (Meldezettel).
6. Switch to Austrian student health insurance and collect your residence permit card.

7 Eligibility Criteria

- Non-EU/EEA/Swiss citizen admitted to an Austrian higher education institution.
- Proof of sufficient funds, accommodation, and health insurance.
- No threat to public order/security.

8 Fees

- Residence Permit – Student: Approx. ~~€156~~–~~€160~~ total (application, grant, ID data).
- Visa D: Varies by country; some missions charge, others waive fees.

9 Processing Times

- Visa C/D: 2–8 weeks.
- Residence Permit – Student: Up to 90 days (apply 12–16 weeks in advance).

10 Tips for a Successful Application

- Apply early (12–16 weeks before travel).
- Provide consistent financial records (avoid unexplained deposits).
- Account for higher rent if applicable.
- Bring legalized and translated documents where required.
- Ensure continuous insurance coverage.
- Submit renewals within 3 months before expiry.
- Always confirm consulate-specific requirements.
